Choices

'School to work' transition refers to the critical socio-economic life changing period between approximately 15 to 24 years of age – a period when young individuals develop and build skills, based on their initial education and training that helps them become productive members of the society ...

...research has shown that transition points in life, or the 'fork in the road' periods, are important times in an individual's life when timely resources and support investment in can assist in avoiding or minimising long-term disadvantage (World Bank, 2009) '

- Support learners to be involved and effectively exercise self-determination (Halpern, 1999)
- Explore to identify of preferred options regardless of real /or perceived challenges (Laragy, 2004)
- Engage in transition planning as a process that occurs for a number of years before the expected end point of school.



How to help?

- Start Early fully explore possibilities
- Expectations- expect independence and ongoing participation in post school settings
- Participation- engage in work experiences
- Collaboration- build a support network (family, school, community business, recreation and education settings, NDIS, DES, SLES)
- Skills development- independence in meals, transport, self care, self advocacy
- Family involvement- is crucial to creating a vision and making it real.



Reform

3. Transitions – Into, Between and Out of School

3.9. The post-school experiences of people with disability should be monitored, including at the individual school level.

4. Developing Inclusive Schools

4.2. Parents, teachers and peers should be equipped to actively avoid and challenge pessimistic attitudes about the capability and potential of students with disability. School needs to actively foster a respectful expectation of achievement.

5. Planning for Success

5.2. Each plan should be focussed on the student, helping them fulfil their capacity and pursue their aspirations – as their maturity allows, the student should be asked what they think they are capable of achieving.

5.3. Planning should involve cooperative engagement of all the major contributors to a child's education, including the student, parent, therapists, teachers, leadership teams and disability co-coordinators.

5.4. Planning meetings should seek consensus about developmentally appropriate approaches, goals, curriculum modifications - a cooperative approach means that 'decisions' should not have not been pre-determined.

5.14 Education authorities should explore ways to improve integration, coordination and complementarity between education planning and other planning processes in a child's life, such as NDIS, *Team Around the Child* processes and foster care planning, with the goal of maximising the support offered to students – *one child: one plan*.
